#### February is Black History Month

February is Black History Month in the United States and Canada. Black History Month, or National African American History Month, is an annual celebration of achievements made by Black Americans and a time to reflect on the central roles of African Americans in United States history.

February was chosen as the appropriate month to celebrate Black History Month because it coincides with the birthdays of former US President Abraham Lincoln and social reformer Frederick Douglass. Both of whom had a significant role in promoting abolition.

Recently, a curious person inquired of me: "Why is there a Black History Month?" Well, there are many reasons, and there are also serious gaps in recorded black history. I can remember from my educational experiences in high school, college, and graduate school that any reference to black history was a brief reference. What I know of black history, I learned on my own, outside the limited framework of formal education.

Not only was there no simple factual and cultural history, there was no history of specific incidences of repression, rebellion, or inhuman practices within the culture of slavery. There are many reasons for this. One is that history was written and published primarily by white/Caucasian people. Since education for slaves was discouraged, even forbidden by law, the slaves would not have had access to their own history even if it had been fairly and accurately recorded. Black history was transmitted almost entirely by oral tradition – by legends and storytelling. Even after the slaves were freed, there was for many years, no provision for education. When black people were admitted into the arena of public education, it was separate from white people, but certainly not equal.

There was history we never heard. Both white and black people were, and are, the poorer for the history about which we've never known. It is important to have an emphasis on Black History to remind us of the history we so easily forget or never knew to begin with.

It is important to teach our children about the past. They need to know what happened lest it happen again. This is not to embitter or perpetuate hate. Our children will never understand who they are or the roots of their own heritage, unless we recite the stories of the past to them.

Black History Month is also an opportunity to understand Black histories, going beyond stories of racism and slavery to spotlight Black achievement. There is a sense in which the meaning of this month relates, not only to African-Americans, but also to non-African Americans. Our history and our future are inextricably woven together. We need the lessons that can come from an emphasis on Black History Month to help us recognize our own biases and prejudices and attempt not to place them on others. We can in fact, honor each other's culture, race, life experience, belief system, class, age and gender. Perhaps then, we can do our best to acknowledge, and validate the feelings and inextricably woven together. We need the lessons that can come from an emphasis on Black History Month to help us recognize our own biases and prejudices and attempt not to place them on others. We can in fact, honor each other's culture, race, life experience, belief system, class, age and gender. Perhaps then, we can do our best to acknowledge, and validate the feelings and achievements of others. Remember it was Jesus who said, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, even as I have loved you."





Exciting things are happening at Trinity. After nearly 50 years of discussion and study, as well as several attempts with various degrees of success, we're finally seriously addressing some of our accessibility issues. Thanks to the incredible generosity of an anonymous donor, we have been gifted a million dollars to make as much of our building available to all regardless of mobility issues. We have voted at the November charge conference to accept the gift and at a January church conference to move forward with the project.

The Trustees have been working with Architectural Insights of Palmer on studying our facility and we've come up with a three-pronged approach that will give access to the basement and first floor. There will be an elevator installed right off the parking lot inside the "Vincent Hall" entrance which will allow access into the JA room and the former Nursery school area, as well

as direct access to the Sanctuary over by the handbell area. We chose this entrance since it's close to parking (unlike our existing ramp) so folks can come to church during inclement weather. The second area will be in the chapel Narthex. The existing lift will be removed – it does function but has been somewhat problematic and is difficult to operate without a trained staff person. We will be removing the 3 stained glass windows (they will be repurposed elsewhere) and a new small vestibule will be installed in a corner of the memorial garden with a lift to bring one from that level up to the Asbury Hall level. The third area will be where the existing water fountain now resides. The fountain will be moved and a door installed in its place with a lift behind it to bring folks down to the chapel level.

We still have things to be worked out and several areas of the building won't be addressed in this plan. We decided on an approach that would have the biggest benefit for the most people at this point and will see if any other areas can be addressed as we move forward.
